SIALOGRAM

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the Radiology Department. We hope the following information about your attendance for an Sialogram x-ray will be helpful.

WHAT IS A SIALOGRAM?

A Sialogram is an x-ray procedure that looks at the salivary ducts and glands. A small tube is inserted into the glands. Contrast (x-ray dye) is then injected into the salivary glands, which allows them to be seen more clearly on the x-ray pictures. The dye will show any stones, narrowed areas or if the duct is dilated.

WILL THERE BE ANY DISCOMFORT?

You may feel mild discomfort when the tube is inserted into the salivary duct. No anaesthetic is required for this procedure.

PREPARATION FOR THE PROCEDURE

There is no preparation for the procedure but you may be asked to remove earring/dentures etc.

DURING THE PROCEDURE

You will lie on your back and the x-ray equipment will move into position. We may perform a check x-ray to ensure the equipment is positioned over the jaw/gland area.

If required, you will be given a sour tasting liquid, such as lemon juice; this will open your salivary ducts.

With your mouth open, the salivary duct is located and the tube is inserted.

Contrast is injected into the salivary glands through the tube and images are taken. The contrast will drain from the salivary duct into your mouth once the tube is removed. This can be swallowed or spat out.

ARE THERE ANY RISKS?

Some people occasionally have an allergic reaction to the x-ray dye. To assess the risk of this, we will ask you for information before we give you the injection.

There are some small risks involved with x-rays but only the minimum amount of radiation is used to produce the images required. The results of your x-ray will give your doctor useful information about your condition and will help to plan your treatment.

AFTER THE PROCEDURE?

You may eat and drink normally.

There may be some discomfort or jaw pressure when the x-ray dye is injected and it is usual to have a slight swelling of the face after the examination. You may take normal painkillers, such as paracetamol, to ease this.

HOW WILL I RECEIVE THE RESULTS?

The images will be reviewed and a report sent back to the Consultant who referred you for the procedure.

PARKING

The nearest car park to the Radiology Department is car park 1 - Park and Pay using paybyphone. The machine also accepts card or cash. You will then need to make your way to Level 1 via the South entrance. Limited Disability parking spaces are available under the Nye Bevan building near the Emergency Department (ED).
